

### **Federal Elections Primary 2020**

- Primary Turnout 2020 = 54.87% 90,000 more votes
- · More Republicans voted than Democrats
- 320,050 votes out of 696,261
- · All mail election for first time
- President Donald Trump (R) v. Joe Biden (D)
  - Donald Trump (R)- Won Montana in 2016
- U.S. House Matt Rosendale (R) v. Kathleen Williams (D)
  - Up for grabs
  - · We might have a second house seat after census
- U.S. Senate Sen. Daines (R) Incumbent v. Steve Bullock (D)
  - Top five Senate seats in the U.S.
  - · Polls have candidates neck and neck

  - Troy Downing (R) v. Shane Morigeau (D) Business man who moved to Montana v. State Representative attorney who is the first Native American running for this office

  - Melissa Romano (D) v. Elsie Artnzen (R) Superintendent Elsie Artnzen is running again, against the same opponent as 2016

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### Who wins and why?

- ➤ Very unpredictable time.
- ➤ Protests and more
- ➤ It's always about the economy
- Amateur candidates -- never run for statewide office before, but win if they think strategically and get statewide support
- ➤ Midterm vs presidential candidates presidential elections have more youth voting and 90,000 more voted than before in the 2020 primary
- ➤ 2016 Election and 2020 Primary in Montana were the first times in Montana history that the top of the ticket (President) didn't get the most votes
- ➤ Either Governor or congressional offices received the highest votes in 2016 and 2020



### **2019 LEGISLATIVE NUMBERS**

- More than 40 new House members out of 82 open seats on the general election ticket and 4 new Senators out of 21 open seats on the general election ticket.
- The 65<sup>th</sup> Legislature adjourned Sine Die on April 25, 2019.
- 88 days with the legislature, leaving 2 days early.
- 3324 legislative bill drafts, 700 more than requested in the 2017 legislative session.
- 1311 Bills introduced and of those, 623 bills were passed by the legislature.

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### **MONTANA LEGISLATURE**

- Control of the State Senate and House by Republicans
- Currently:
  - -- State Senate 30 Republicans and 20 Democrats
  - -- State House 60 Republicans and 40 Democrats
- Estimated:
  - -- State Senate 30 Republicans and 20 Democrats
  - -- State House 59 Republicans and 41 Democrats
  - -- 7 Swing Seats in the Senate and 15 swing seats in the House
- Redistricting and U.S. Census



- Montana has a populous background and every vote counts in Montana; one seat decided by 32 votes in 2020 primary. More state have become Red or Blue but in a recent analysis of ticket splitting it states Montana ranks #1 and North Dakota ranks #2 in the country. Montana is a purple state as reflected in the split of Republican and Democrat leaders in the statewide and legislative offices and in the positions of the legislators in many bills.
- Influence in the 2019 legislative session:
  - First, the strongest influences were the moderate Republicans .
  - Second, the Democrat Governor and legislative Democrats.
  - Lastly, the Republican Conservatives leadership in the House and Senate were procedurally in charge, but not always on key substantive issue.
- For the Republicans, the past few sessions have mostly shown to be a battle within the party over who is representing Montana taxpayers and Montana's best interests.

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



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
### **2021 LEGISLATIVE NUMBERS**

- July 2020 Prediction: Republicans will pick up seats in the House, but keep majorities (59 seats +)
- July 2020 Prediction: Republicans will maintain their control over the State Senate (30 seats +)
- More than 38 potentially new House members out of 64 open seats on the general election and 4 potentially new Senators out of 16 open seats in the general election

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### **2019 LEGISLATION**

House Bill 85 by Representative Greg DeVries

- \* HB 85 was introduced at the request of the Montana Commissioner of Insurance Matt Rosendale.
- As introduced to the legislature at the first hearing this bill was the culmination of a collaborative process with the Montana Secretary of State's office to bring efficiency to the process of working with both the Commissioner's office and Secretary of State's office in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century of filing Articles of Incorporation.
- HB85 addresses the process for insurance companies (including captives) to file Articles of Incorporation.
- HB85 removes the archaic "file in triplicate" language and brings the process into the internet age. The law changes will increase efficiency by improving the flow of paperwork (and reducing the volume of it) between the Commissioner of Insurance and the Montana Secretary of State.
- As a result of HB85, captive insurance clients will now have more of a "One-Stop Shop" at the Commissioner's office for either forming a new captive with Articles of Incorporation, or dissolving a captive at the end of its useful life.
- ❖ The effective date for HB85 was July 1, 2019.



### **2019 LEGISLATION**

#### Senate Bill 55 by Senator Dan Salomon

- SB 55 was introduced at the request of the Montana Commissioner of Insurance Matt Rosendale. Commissioner Rosendale's office worked with MCIA lobbyist Aimee Grmoljez and MCIA Chair John Huth to pass this bill. As introduced to the legislature at the first hearing many of the changes in SB55 were cleaning up the Montana code sections, but there were a few changes that were significant.
- SB 55 as originally drafted increased the percentage of captive premium tax retained in the Captive Regulatory and Supervision state special revenue fund from 5% to 20% and decreased the percentage dedicated to the general fund by 15%. The change was to cover the operating costs of the captive insurance program. As SB 55 progressed through the process the Commissioner's office determined it was better to pass the bill without a change in the percentage of the captive premium tax retained by the fund and not transferred to the state General Fund. The concern was that this change in percentage would kill SB 55 along the legislative path or at the Governor's office with a veto.

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- Senate Bill 55 (SB55) as passed, has three main significant changes:
  - The first one is that all protected cells will now have to be incorporated or formed as an LLC. Previously protected cells could be formed as either an incorporated cell or an unincorporated cell. The separate legal entity status that results from incorporating a cell, or forming it as an LLC, makes it easier for a protected cell to open bank & brokerage accounts, and very importantly it should also strengthen the "virtual firewall" between cells, as well as between a cell and the Core Company.
  - The second change deals with Letters of Credit (LOC). Before SB 55, captives that
    wanted to use a LOC for its capital & surplus had to use a bank that was either
    Montana-chartered or a member of the Federal Reserve to issue the LOC. Now the
    Department will have the flexibility to have discretion to approve an LOC issued by a
    bank chartered in another state, even if the bank is not a member of the Federal
    Reserve.
  - The third change is the \$300 annual license fee will apply to all stand-alone captives, protected cells and series captives. This levels the playing field for all captives.
  - The other changes were law clean-up items that made Montana Law consistent. The effective date for these changes was July 1, 2019.
